A week of exploring Cornwall on foot

Cornwall has almost 400 miles of stunning coastline - the longest of any English county. Much of it is designated as an *Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty* and we will show you exactly why Cornwall has such a special designation...

Our guided walking holidays share with you the very finest parts of Cornwall. Safe scenic footpaths (part of the famous South West Way) follow spectacular cliff-tops, passing remote and beautiful beaches, sand dune systems and atmospheric tidal creeks. We'll also walk through grassy meadows and farmland, ancient woodlands, pretty villages - and over high granite moorland, scattered with prehistoric remains.

Our walking holidays are ideal for singles, couples and families. Our group size averages no more than eight, so it's easy to get to know everyone during the holiday and you'll most likely make some great new friends.

During our almost 40 years of operation, thousands of visitors from all around the world have discovered the magical beauty of Cornwall with us and made many new friends. Whatever the mix of the group, English is always the primary language spoken, although our groups are often an eclectic mix of different nationalities. We will arrange your accommodation for you in and around the charming village of St. Agnes (mid north coast). We offer you a choice of carefully selected Hotels, Inns, Bed & Breakfasts and Home Stays, where you will receive a warm welcome and enjoy welcoming Cornish hospitality.

With Martin as your local knowledgeable guide, you will take daily hikes into beautiful Cornwall, where he will share with you many of the loveliest and secret places, wildlife and history he has unearthed over his lifetime so far. His journey is always an ongoing affair, so you never know what latest gem he's discovered that he'll reveal for you.

Cornwall possesses magnificent wildlife set in a huge variety of spectacular landscapes and habitats and an amazing array of wildflowers which bloom from April onwards, together with sub-tropical gardens that flourish in Cornwall's very mild maritime climate. Incredibly sculptured rocks form high majestic sea cliffs and secluded coves, with rare and breathtaking geological exposures frequently encountered. Even if the study of geology has passed

you by until now, you'll be amazed at the crystalline wonders encountered along the Cornish coast.

There are prehistoric settlements and high granite moors; creeks cloaked in ancient woodland; rolling green countryside and quaint seaside villages, where many artists work - inspired by Cornwall's majestic scenery.

This beautiful county is full of stunning coastal and interior scenery and natural history, best explored on foot. Cut off from England by the Tamar River, Cornwall has been a 'land apart' since the Romans drove the Celts into the wild hilly lands of the west of Britain 2,000 years ago - when this area was known as Dumnonia. However, the original Celtic

character is still preserved in some parts of Cornwall, both in the people and the physical landscape itself. In places, there are fields and stone hedges which were created up to 4,500 years ago by Cornwall's prehistoric Bronze and Iron Age inhabitants. On the high hills and moors, there are megalithic remains of standing stones and circles, long abandoned prehistoric villages and other sites of interest such as Quoits, Holy Wells, Celtic Crosses and ancient Burial Chambers (here known as Barrows, or Tumuli). There are some areas where spectacular relics of long past tin and copper mining are evident, now forming part of the UNESCO Cornish Mining World Heritage Site.

Martin is quite passionate about enabling his guests to have fun learning about Cornwall, by stopping for an informal lecture, taking a closer look at the frequent natural phenomena, enjoying an exploratory scramble, taking a swim - or perhaps exploring with him, some of our awesome and majestic sea caves.

About the walks

Join us here in Cornwall and discover the county's incredible diversity of land and seascapes, wildlife, geology, archaeology, myths, legends - and the amazing variety of artistic expression that Cornwall has generated.

We promise you a holiday with nature at its heart...and because we have spent a lifetime exploring our little patch of the Earth and all it contains; you will experience many amazing aspects of the county that many visitors miss.

We do not advertise a specific itinerary because we have found, over many years, that it is best to wait and see what the daily weather brings. For example, it would not be comfortable to set off on a walk into a strong headwind and rain; and thankfully, with such an extensive and incredibly convoluted coastline, we can usually find an area that is very

pleasant to walk in - and hopefully in the sunshine too. After a hearty Cornish breakfast, we set off each day in our minibus to explore a different face of Cornwall. After a scenic 20 to 50 minute drive (depending on where we are walking that particular day) and using as many "lesser used roads" as possible, we commence our journey on foot, with an average duration of 6 hours walking per day. Typically, we will walk between 6-8 miles (9-13 km's) per day. However, because of the "ups and downs" of our sometimes rugged coastal paths, it might feel as though you have actually walked a little more on some days, although we can make things much easier if necessary!

Our walks are relatively relaxed and are well within the ability of someone who exercises regularly and is of reasonable fitness. During our walks, there is always ample scope for stopping and observing wildlife and other natural phenomena, without rushing. We have found that with so much to look at, this fairly gentle pace suits most people, giving you a chance to be alone with nature from time to time.

We will explain the basics of many natural concepts for you in an interesting and light hearted way, so that Cornwall's natural and man made history,

the magnificent coastline, the many vastly different landscapes - including the high granite moors and the wooded tidal estuaries (together with all the wildlife) really come alive for you.

And because of our intimate knowledge of Cornwall, we often find ourselves on a remote and beautiful beach for our lunch, where after a hearty picnic lunch, you can rest, beach-comb, explore the rock pools and awesome sea caves, or perhaps enjoy a refreshing swim in the clear crystal clear turquoise seas (The Atlantic and The English Channel). Many of our beaches really are the best in the world!

At such times, it's not uncommon to see Grey Seals on the rocks or in the water and sometimes, whales and dolphins close to shore - always an exciting and uplifting experience. And with luck, you'll also see the ubiquitous Chough, Cornwall's emblematic red beaked bird, now returned after an absence of 80 years.

Of course, you are free to simply relax after lunch, perhaps sitting amongst carpets of wild flowers with the sounds of nature enveloping you in a perfect peaceful ambience.

Turquoise Waters

When it's sunny and calm, not only are the waters around the Cornwall coast crystal clear, but the refracted sunlight off the sandy bottom creates an incredible colour ranging between green, blue and turquoise - just like The Aegean or The Caribbean. Sometimes, it's really mind boggling!

Rocks and Gardens!

There are two things in particular for which Cornwall is world renowned - its magnificent gardens and its remarkable geology.

There are a large number of world class gardens and estates in Cornwall. Because of the Gulf Stream, Cornwall rarely experiences frost and snow, so the gardens here are home to many rare plants that would die elsewhere, particularly magnolias, rhododendrons, camellias and azaleas. The great estate owners of the 18th century sponsored botanists to accompany sailing voyages to far away lands and bring back exotic species to plant in their gardens, so they could impress their friends. In those days, wealthy people could only express their wealth through their homes and gardens and fancy horse drawn carriages - there were no heated swimming pools, flashy cars, luxury yachts and private jets!

Much of the wealth in Cornwall was generated through mining tin and copper and of course, only the few wealthy land owners really benefitted at the time. However, today we have this legacy of wonderful gardens, open to the public - so in the end we can all share in that wealth.

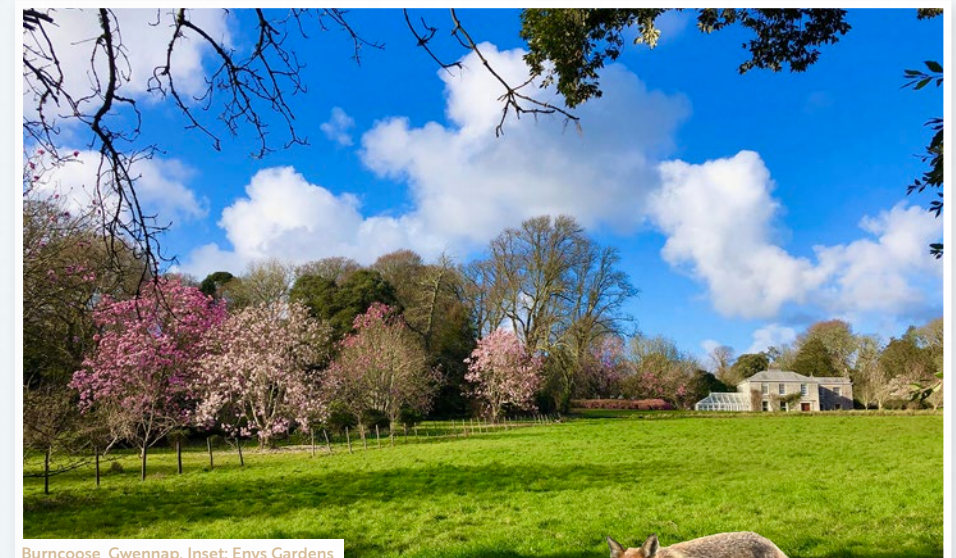
That almost obscene wealth was actually created by working class Cornish miners in the 18th and 19th centuries, although extraction of tin and copper goes right back to prehistoric times. The mining took place because of the unusual

geology in Cornwall - which is varied and very special.

300 million years ago, molten granite magma rose up into the country rock underneath Cornwall and emplaced rich vein deposits of tin, copper, iron, zinc, tungsten, lead and silver - not to mention many other rare minerals.

Consequently, Cornwall is blessed with an incredible mixture of rock types up to 500 million years old and these various rocks have shaped the land, particularly the coastline, through many millions years of erosion. This is why

walking along the coast paths always surprises and delights, for the scenery changes rapidly, depending on which rock type you are walking through. You have to imagine that walking along the coast reveals a complete cross section of what normally lies beneath your feet! Being one of the few places in the world where tin and copper are found together meant that Cornwall was able to produce the raw materials for bronze production, so that the Industrial Revolution thrived in Britain.

Rugged cliffs

The coastline around Cornwall boasts the most spectacular cliffs, coves, and beaches. From headlands that jut sharply out to sea, to undulating cliff-lines adorned with wildflowers, and geological marvels that are awaiting your discovery as we wander these ancient paths.

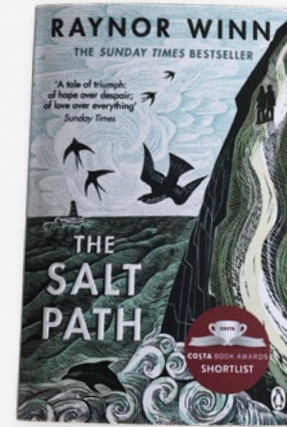

Historically, tin mining was important in the Cornish economy, becoming increasingly significant during the Middle Ages and expanding greatly during the 19th century, when rich copper mines were also in production.

By the mid-19th century, however, the tin and copper mines entered a period of decline and virtually ended by the 1870's.

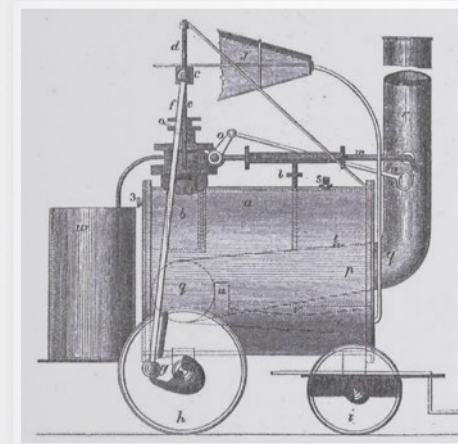

The cultural landscape

Cornwall has influenced many famous writers and artists through her magical nature and enchanting scenery.

Daphne DuMaurier (Left) Winston Graham (Poldark), Virginia Woolf, Derek Tangye, John Betjeman, Rosamunde Pilcher, Mary Wesley, EV Thompson, Raynor Winn, Thomas Hardy and John Le Carre - to name a few!

The poet Laurence Binyon wrote 'For the Fallen' (first published in 1914) while he was contemplating the horrors of WW1, sitting on the high volcanic cliffs between Pentire Point and The Rumps, on Cornwall's rugged north coast A

stone plaque was erected in 2001 to commemorate this. The plaque bears the inscription 'FOR THE FALLEN' which bears the fourth stanza, sometimes referred to as 'The Ode' of the poem:

"They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn them. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them."

The scientific landscape

Cornwall has produced some of the world's best known scientists and engineers.

From astronomer John Couch Adams to clockmaker John Belling, Richard Trevithick's high pressure steam boiler (left) and William Bickford's safety fuse were developed here in Cornwall. The lifesaving 'rocket apparatus' was invented by Henry Trengrouse of Helston and for many years up until helicopters came into service, it helped those who had been shipwrecked safely reach the shore.

Sir Humphry Davy was responsible for isolating several elements such as sodium and barium. His experiments resulted in the first electric light which Michael Faraday, Davy's apprentice, later developed further. He is best known for the invention of the miner's safety lamp.

Another less-appreciated first for Cornwall is the development of gas

lighting by engineer William Murdoch, and he used it to light his house in Redruth in the 1790s - the first in the world! This house still stands, 8 minute's drive from Martins' home.

The Lizard (Cornwall and England's most southerly point) was the location Marconi chose for his 'great experiment' in telecommunications, when in 1900 he developed radio transmission that followed the curvature of the earth (not something that anyone had ever imagined was possible) - eventually culminating in a radio transmission clear across The Atlantic to Newfoundland - an endeavour that was eventually to mark the birth of globalization and in turn, lead to today's 'world wide web' - hence you receiving this brochure electronically, as if by magic!

Poldark (BBC)

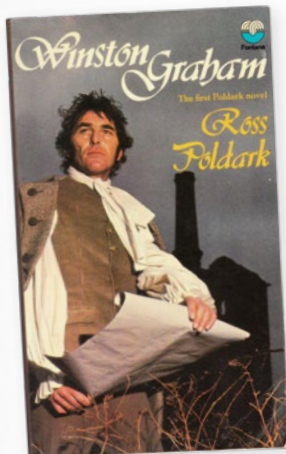

The author, **Winston Graham** (1908-2003), was born in Manchester, England. When he was 17 years old, he relocated to Perranporth (near St Agnes) in Cornwall. His first novel, *'The House with the Stained Glass Windows'*, was published in 1934.

The novelist is best known for the Poldark series of historical fiction. The first being *'Ross Poldark'*, published in 1945, followed by eleven books, the last of which, *'Bella Poldark'*, was published in 2002.

We will visit many of the locations used in Poldark - and who knows, we may well bump into the cast and crew filming on one of the beautiful cliff tops or beaches, if the BBC decide to film a new series!
