A week of exploring the Isles of Scilly, on foot

A Stunning Archipelago Set in Radiant Turquoise Seas. Our first walking tour of the Isles of Scilly in 2004 was such a huge success, that we have been running a couple of trips to these golden isles every year ever since because it's so beautiful there, we just have to keep going back!

Situated about 30 miles south west of Lands' End, this exquisite group of about 100 islands and islets sit magically and serenely out in the turquoise blue Atlantic Ocean.

We stay on St Mary's (the largest of the inhabited islands) at the 'eco-friendly' Mincarlo Guest House, located directly on the waterfront overlooking Hugh Town harbor, with beautiful sunset views. During the week, we will spend a day (perhaps more) exploring St Mary's. This island has a circumference of approximately 12 miles and has the largest footpath network. It is also the most rural island, with large arable areas under daffodil flower and bulb cultivation and other vegetables.

Then we will use the wonderful wooden passenger boats to access 4 other different outer islands on the other days; St Agnes, Bryher, Treco, St Martins - and perhaps even the uninhabited island of Samson. The boat trips depend to a certain extent on the prevailing weather, although they nearly always run every day. They are a little adventure in themselves - a really great way to commence and end the day.

Probably the most fantastic aspect of these islands is the clear light and the magical turquoise seas, particularly when the weather is settled and the sea is calm. Because the air is so very clean out there in the Atlantic, there are fantastic lichens everywhere. In fact, these islands are the very first 'landfall' between England and North America. The large 'twice daily' tides of up to 26ft sweep the beaches clean every day and the surrounding relatively warm sea water keeps the archipelago somewhat mild, which is why sub-tropical plants flourish here.

The islands have a wonderful flora, being bathed by the Gulf Stream, which

keeps them mild the year round. They are famous for their 'wavy maritime heath' and particularly the early spring flowers - especially daffodils and narcissi - and later, when we run our August tour, there are masses of blue and white agapanthus and great swathes of ling and bell heather and beautiful succulents, such as mesembryanthemum and Hottentot Fig.

Most of the islands are quite small and can easily be explored in a single day - leaving enough time to 'do your own thing' - relaxing on some remote gorgeous beaches or on cliff tops with stunning views over the archipelago.

These islands are composed of granite that is 296 million years old and they do not have any large hills - the highest point being only about 155 feet (50m) above sea level.

On most of the islands there are numerous white sandy beaches and spectacular granite outcrops. On the island of Treco, there is a renowned walled garden called 'The Abbey Gardens', which is set amongst the ruins of an old 13th century medieval priory.

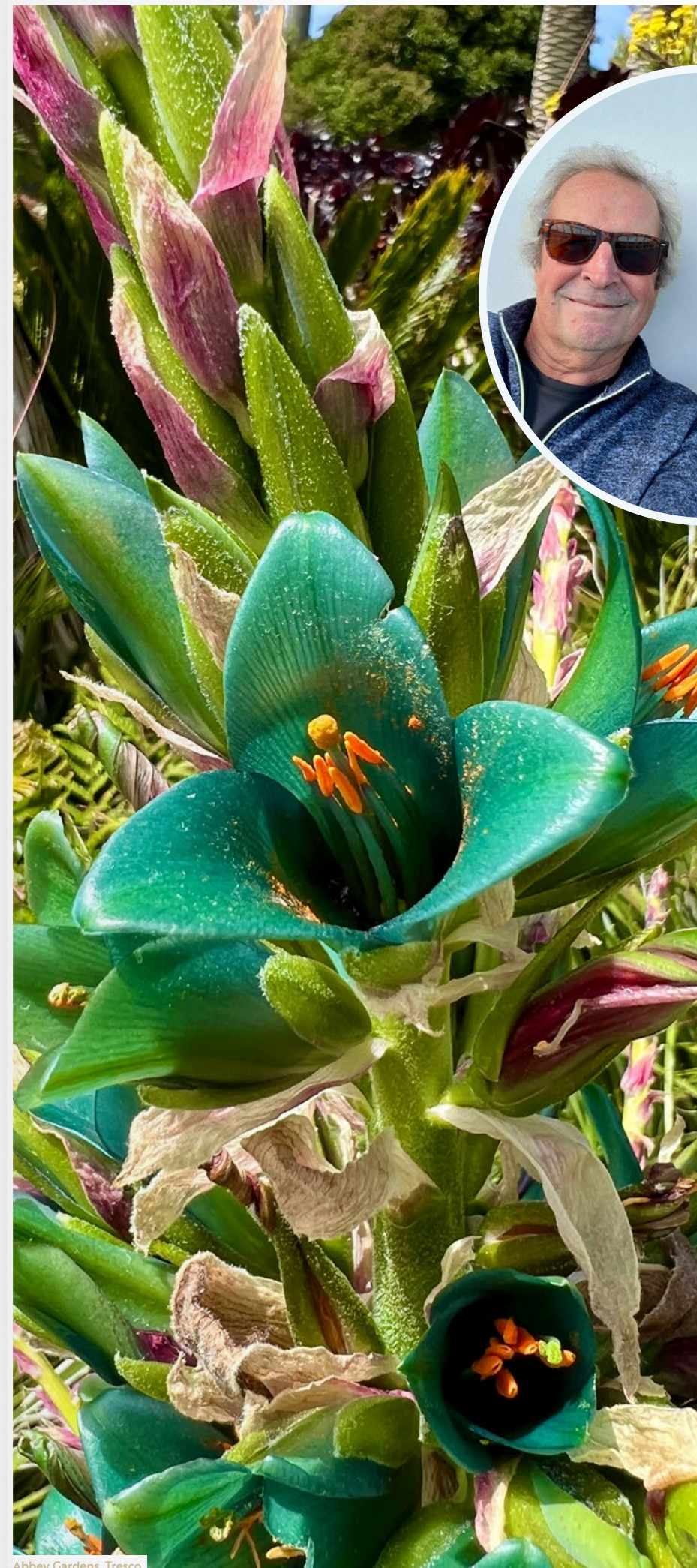
It has many rare plants and is exotic and sub-tropical in nature. Entry is included on your holiday.

On the day we visit the beautiful island of St Agnes, we may (tides and weather permitting) dine in the famous 'Turks Head' pub and take the late evening boat back to St Mary's.

In June, the days will be very long, with about 18 hours of daylight, in August somewhat less. Sunsets on the Isles of Scilly are quite often spectacular and happen frequently. It is lovely to relax and view them from our westerly facing guesthouse patio.

We might take an optional wildlife viewing boat trip to some of the outer isles. The wildlife is very varied, with seals, puffins (June only), guillemots, razorbills, shags, ravens, peregrines, kestrel, cormorants and many other species.

The waters are exceptionally clear and turquoise in colour and sometimes, Leather Backed Turtles, Bottle Nosed Dolphins, Porpoise, Sunfish and Minke Whales can be seen.

Bryher beach

There is an ancient legend in Cornwall that there once existed an advanced culture called 'Lyonesse' on an island placed somewhere west of Lands' End. The legend tells of the island being destroyed in a great cataclysmic inundation/flood/earthquake back in the dark ages. There is indeed some geological evidence that this may have in fact occurred. The island's recent history is long and convoluted - having been the home of many famous people throughout historical time. For example, the young King Charles 1st came to the Scilly Isles to try and escape from Oliver Cromwell during the English Civil War.

Ultimately, he failed. There are many surviving relics from the civil war days and later fortifications from the 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th centuries.

We will visit the pretty little churchyard of Old Town. In this same cemetery

can be seen numerous graves and memorials to those who have perished in the many shipwrecks that have occurred here over the centuries.

In 1707, when returning with the fleet to England *'Admiral of the Fleet'*, Sir Cloudesley Shovell's ship, HMS Association, struck on the Western Rocks along with several other ships and broke up. The event was witnessed by those on board HMS St George and it was said that the ship 'went down in three or four minutes', not a soul being saved of 800 men on board. With three other large ships also being wrecked (HMS Eagle, HMS Romney and HMS Firebrand), nearly 2,000 sailors were lost that terrible night.

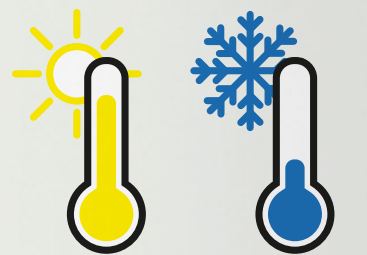
This Scilly Isles disaster was one of the greatest maritime disasters in the history of the British Navy. It was later determined that the main cause of the

disaster was the navigators' inability to accurately calculate their longitude.

The islands are home to an unusually large number of prehistoric chambered burial tombs dating from the Bronze Age. Possibly, in ancient times, it was desirable for tribal chieftains to have themselves 'laid to rest' in these western islands, which says something quite remarkable about the islands' perceived beauty, mystery and of course their sacred status.

There will be one (optional) free day during the holiday; giving you time to browse the galleries and shops, relax on the beach, take a leisurely walk on your own - or simply take in the enchanting views from the front patio at Mincarlo, whilst sitting in a deck chair taking it easy.

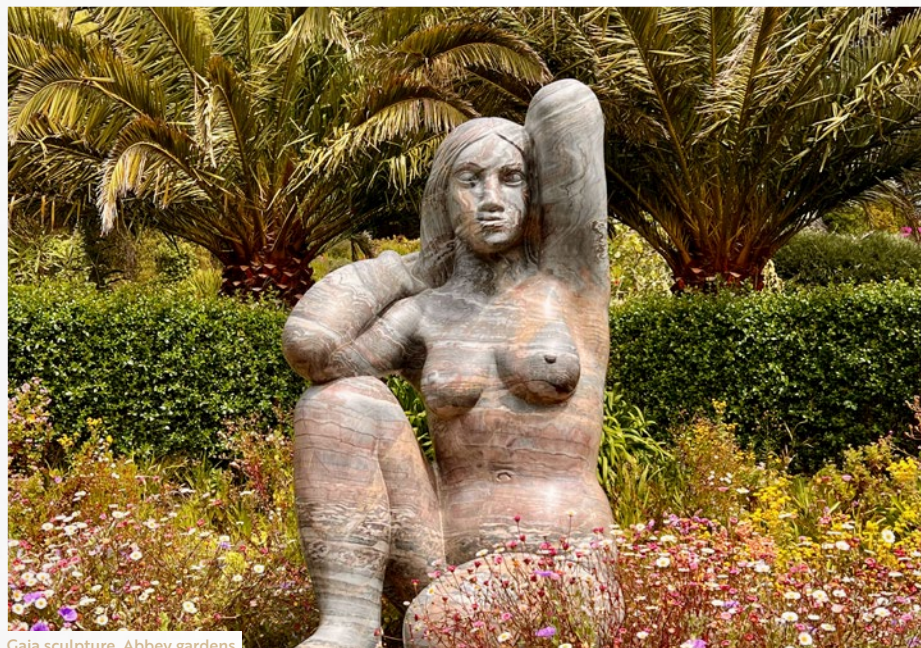
Average Temperature on the Isles of Scilly in summer

The temperatures mentioned above are only average...there can be days of up to 25C



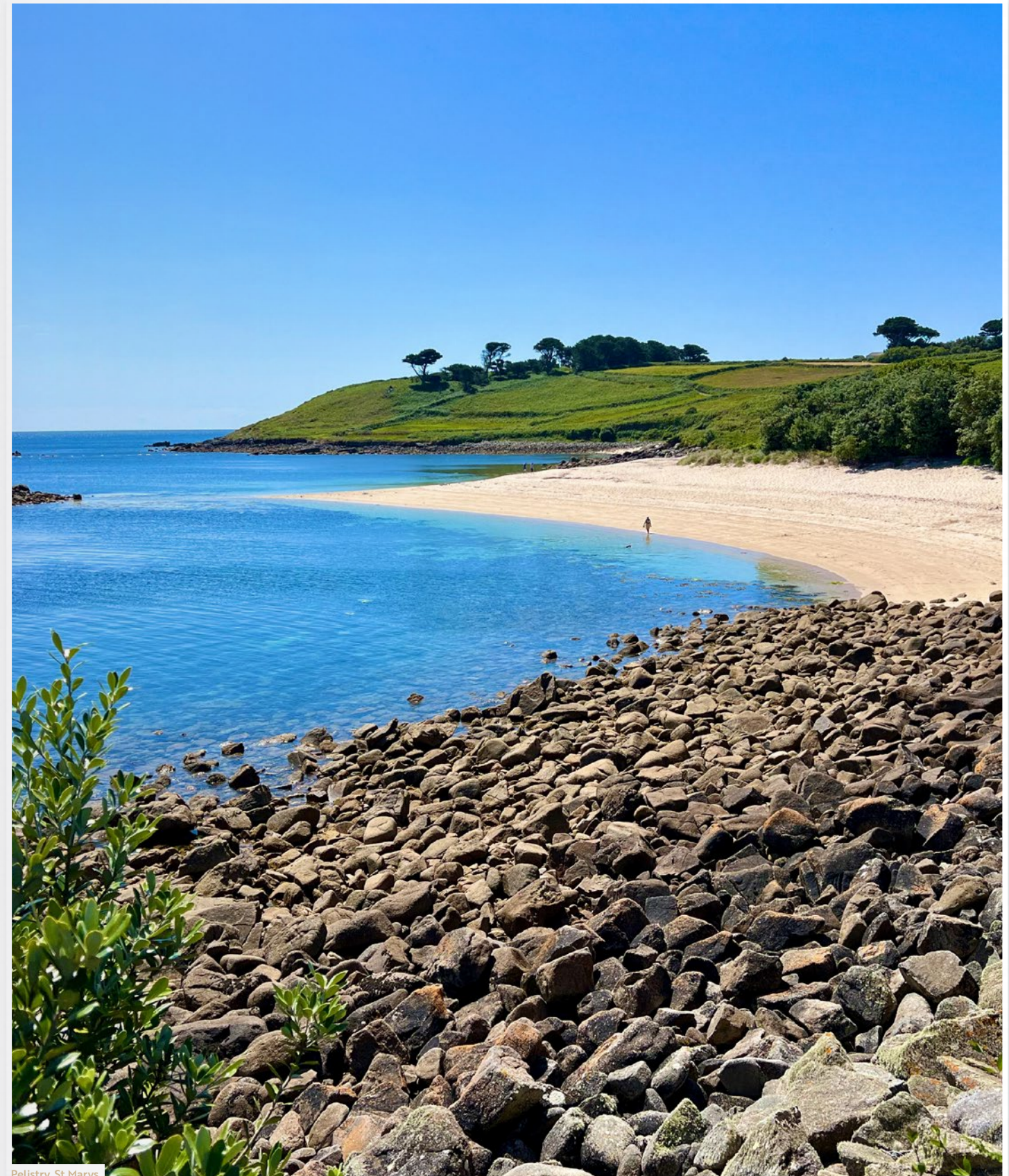
Gaia sculpture, Abbey gardens
