A week of exploring Dartmoor on foot

Dartmoor is the last great wilderness remaining in southern Britain. It is situated in the beautiful and green county of Devon – north of Plymouth and west of Exeter – just east of Cornwall. If you look at a topographical map, you will see an 'up-land' area in the mid central southern part of Devon that's coloured differently... that's because Dartmoor is largely un-cultivated, semi wilderness moorland.

There are about 360 square miles of high open granite moorland, rising to just over 2,000 feet above sea level – and about another 120 square miles of somewhat lower countryside (between 500 – 1000 ft a.s.l.), where many enchanting rivers and streams rush through shady oak, birch and beech woodlands, on their twisted journeys down to the sea, some 25 miles or so distant.

Parts of Dartmoor are cultivated, however they are only small pockets on and around the edges of the moors – and sometimes right in the middle of the moors, where conditions permit cultivation.

Most of the central parts of the high moors are rough heather-clad and grass covered heaths, with high hills or tors (as they are known locally) punctuating the terrain – and where they still possess rocky cores, these tors present dramatic rocky monoliths which have sometimes been weathered into amazing shapes and huge piles.

The granite itself is about 296 million years old and was intruded into an uplifting range of mountains, due to the African tectonic plate colliding with the Eurasian plate. This was long before any creatures ever roamed the surface of the land. Dartmoor is the Jewel in the heart of the West Country and its High Moor is one of the last true wildernesses to be found in Southern England today. A National Park since 1951, the area encompasses a large swathe of Devon's most beautiful moorland, countryside and villages.

Nowhere else will you find such a unique blend of features that show man's occupation spanning a period between 6,000 BC and today – coupled with such mystical and myriad enchantment and breath-taking natural beauty. Surprisingly, it is not difficult to spend most of the day walking considerable distances and hardly meet anyone else – if anyone at all!

In many ways, Dartmoor is a totally unique landscape, as although it's designated a National Park, it is also home to many working farms and quite a few small towns, villages and even smaller settlements. Many of these settlements range in ages between 5,000 BC and the present day and there are few places in The British Isles that possess such a 'long continuum' of human settlement. Exploring the moors on foot brings one closer to one's distant

ancestors and evokes peaceful feelings of living in a kind of eternity, as that is what immersing oneself in wild nature does to the soul. With the moors' dense assembly of prehistoric settlements, standing stones and circles, etc - one can easily imagine life here thousands of years ago, when Dartmoor was an upland forest, punctuated by high granite tors (immense piles of weirdly eroded granite rocks) inhabited by Bronze and Iron ages tribal peoples.

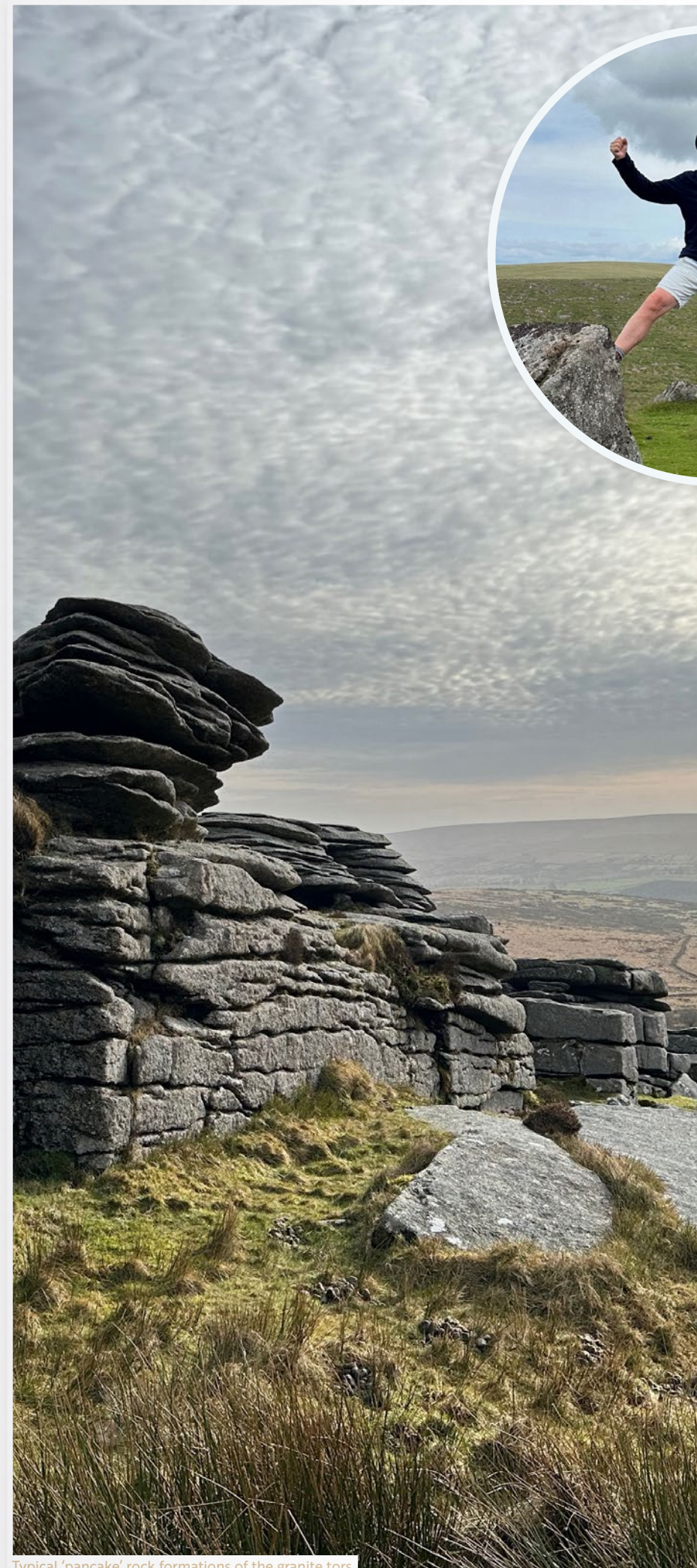
Martin Hunt

Over 38 years ago, Martin spearheaded his unique discovery walking holidays in Cornwall and founded what became the very first walking tour operator in Cornwall – Adventureline. Often mimicked, but never equalled. Martin began his Dartmoor tours some 24 years ago, having grown up here.

And now Martin's son Pete is joining his dad fully in 2025, having been involved partially for the past two years. Like Martin, Pete also grew up on Dartmoor and just loves walking and sharing the bounties of Dartmoor's nature and history too. Pete will often lead any of the slightly more challenging hikes, while Martin imparts knowledge and accompanies the easier ones. Having Pete along will allow an expansion of possibilities; eg linear hikes across the moors, which would not be possible if one had to make a circuit.

Keeping their groups small (average 7 or 8), Martin and Pete maintain an intimacy and cohesion (with humour!), which is warmly appreciated by all. Martin and Pete are always interested in others, so you will be appreciated and enjoyed too, for whoever you are and wherever you come from. Their groups often turn out to be an International mix too.

Martin and Pete are quite passionate about enabling their guests to have fun learning about Dartmoor, by stopping for an informal lecture, taking a closer look at the frequent natural phenomena, enjoying an exploratory scramble on the granite tors – and even taking a swim in one of the several enchanting rivers that run off the moors, through beautiful deep wooded valleys.

About the walks

You will be amazed at the diversity of Dartmoor. We will walk amongst mystical stone circles and ancient Bronze and Iron Age settlements, pretty market towns and imposing castles.

At a gentle pace we will marvel at the high granite Tors, walk wild and remote moorland, maybe cooling our feet in the clear flowing rivers tumbling off the high moors, that give way to lush valleys and gorges where we might find an otter or two playing in the sunshine.

Dartmoor is home to a unique and hardy wild small pony. Beautiful buzzards hover overhead, kingfishers dart amongst the bonsai oak forests in the river valleys and we will discover the atmospheric lost villages where our ancient ancestors lived in long ago prehistoric times.

Our personally guided walking holiday will share with you some of the very finest parts of Dartmoor National Park and its environs.

Our fully inclusive walking holidays are ideal for singles, couples and families. Our group size is usually about 8, so it's easy to get to know everyone. During our 38 years of operation, visitors from around the world have made many new friends. Whatever the mix of the group, English is the primary language spoken.

Typically, we will walk between 5-9 miles (8-14km's) per day. However, because of the *ups and downs* of Dartmoor's sometimes rugged landscapes, it might feel as though you have actually walked a little more on some days, although the walks are not too challenging. Lunch is not provided on this tour, however we can easily pick up a snack at the nearby local shops. After a Two Bridges Hotel breakfast, you won't need much! A semi free day may see us exploring Tavistock or similar, when lunch will also be at your own expense.

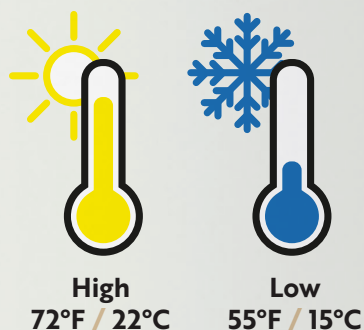

This wonderful example of an English country house is festooned with tapestries and textiles, arms and armour, pewter, brass and old oak furniture – we will stroll through a magical valley garden, which includes a medieval stew pond and dovecote, on to the tranquil upper garden and orchards planted with apples and cherries – and down through enchanting woodlands to the tidal Tamar River.

Historic treasures

Dartmoor is strewn with ancient buildings and all manner of things made from granite...

They include such things as granite gateposts, stone rows, circles and standing stones, burial chambers (kists), medieval crosses and memorial stones, or structures such as churches, cottages and farms, castles, holy wells, ash houses and bee boles (hives).

There is an outstanding and rare example of a Dartmoor Grade I listed unconverted medieval longhouse. Owned by the park authority, this amazing building has many interesting historic features, a cobbled floor, beams, roof timbers - all adding to the ambiance of the property. Dartmoor has over 100 longhouses; buildings that

remain in use to this day, some now used as farm buildings, but most still as dwelling houses. The earliest examples of such longhouses are probably some 650 years old, the tradition of building longhouses on Dartmoor continued – unusually – through to the 18th century. The general rarity of this resource means that the ‘Dartmoor Longhouse’ is regarded as having international importance.

Such historic features are found all over Dartmoor and they are an important part of the cultural heritage, contributing greatly to its local distinctiveness and character.

Some wonderful granite buildings are a little more recent in construction, such as Buckland Abbey https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Buckland_Abbey, once the home of Sir Richard Grenville and later, Sir Francis Drake, back in the 1500's. Depending on the group's wishes, we might visit some of these historic treasures.

Another great treasure is Grimspound <https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Grimspound> a huge henge and settlement where Bronze Age people made their home about 3,300 years ago.

Dartmoor on film!

The 2012 film *War Horse* was filmed in various locations including Ringmoor Down on Dartmoor, not far from where our hotel is located. The movie is an adaptation of Michael Morpurgo's 1982 children's novel of the same name, set before and during WWI.

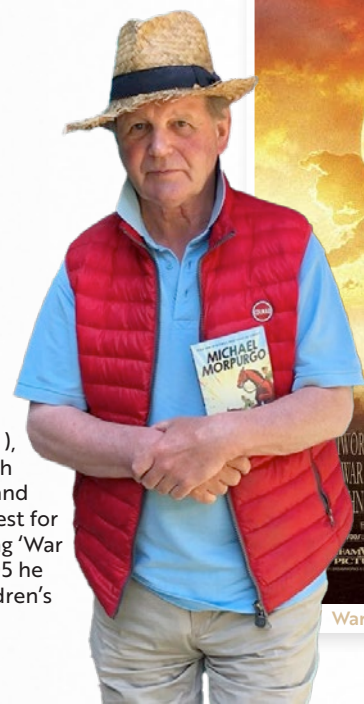
The director, **Steven Spielberg**, was very impressed by Dartmoor, in particular saying: *"I have before, in my long, eclectic career, been gifted with such an abundance of natural beauty such as I experienced whilst filming War Horse. With two and a half weeks of extensive coverage of landscapes and skies, I hardly scratched the surface of the visual opportunities that were offered to me."*

Spielberg said the sunsets in the film, including the final shot of the horse against the sky were not digitally manipulated: *"I only got five shots because the sun goes down awfully fast in Devon."* He added that the production "stretched the budget to go to Devon and it was worth every penny".

Now a huge box office success, 'War Horse' was nominated for six **Academy Awards** including Best Picture, two **Golden Globe Awards** and five **BAFTA** awards.

The 2025 film *Werwulf* is currently being filmed on Dartmoor, with a film set constructed by Sharp Tor above the Dart Gorge. A spectacular location with wild views across the moor, suitable for misty moon-drenched night shots where a werwulf may prowl!

Director **Robert Eggers** is a visionary film maker with titles including *Nosferatu*, *The Northman*, *The Lighthouse* and *The VVitch*. His films, set prior to the 20th century, blend elements of horror, folklore, and mythology and are noted for their historical authenticity and brooding, often dark atmosphere.

Dartmoor has its long-standing history of werewolf's, so an up to date Eggers take on the myth will be a thrilling, and no doubt incredibly scary addition to the genre.
